Further to the development of the Companion and having it become the first front power add on approved for funding by the Ontario Assistive Devices Program (ADP), Cheelcare, a Canadian innovator of mobility devices based in Richmond Hill, Ontario, has made a number of steps assisting in their overall goal of bringing complex rehab

products to market.

They welcomed a bilingual Allex Laurin as their Director of Marketing, Maria Joannou, a seasoned industry education consultant, was introduced as a representative through her company Wingate Wellness, and then the former Permobil Canada General Manager Allan Boyd was introduced as their Vice President of Growth.

Cheelcare is also further supported by a new board member, Roy Ellis, to help the Founders, Eugene Cherny and Dima Paltsev in their pursuit to transition Cheelcare from a Research & Development company, to a company with a focus on the commercialization of its innovative product lines; in particular, Cheelcare's products that are currently completing regulatory testing ahead of their launch into the US and Canada. New investor participation who appreciates the technologies developed have made it possible for the company to enter into a letter of intent with Jo-Jo Capital Canada Ltd. That may result in Cheelcare being listed on the TSX to spur their efforts to raise the capital required to have their products become available in a more commercial manner. There are opportunities to participate and invest in this early-stage Canadian company for those interested. We appreciate the R&D efforts of up-and-coming companies like Cheelcare who work tirelessly to have their vision for products become available to end users.

Snooker Anyone

Snooker was one of the early sports (since 1960) in what is now known as the Paralympic Games. It continued at the games for 28 years (apart from missing the games in 1980) before being dropped as a sport at the games after 1988. Now, the World disability Billiards and Snooker Association (WDBS) is appealing to have the sport reinstated in the Paralympics for 2032.



The sport has been dominated by the British and Irish over the years, but it was Canadian extraordinaire Dean Mellway, that ruled the day in 1976 at the Toronto Olympiad (Etobicoke). He was way too involved to defend his title with the number of administrative and advocacy

roles he has played over the years. In a nutshell, Dean graduated with an MSW from Wilfred Laurier University and began his career with Ontario March of Dimes, moved to Ottawa to become the Executive Director of the Canadian Wheelchair Sports Association, and later moved to Carleton University and is still there. He has held numerous senior positions and advocacy roles.

Dean could compete in any of the sports but excelled in Snooker, Wheelchair Basketball, Sledge Hockey, Wheelchair Tennis, and Wheelchair Slalom while holding many senior positions to move the goal posts forward for the next generation. Whatever it takes to assist in creating a better life for folks with a disability ranks at the top of the agenda even today in his role with Carleton in Facilities, Management and Planning while involving provincial and federal accessibility organizations, Rick Hansen Foundation, etc.

Good job "Deano", I hope snooker gets into the 2032 games and that you have the time and energy to do what you did in 1976!
